Gjermo also thanked the Cambridge Foundation, who made a big impact in making the new library a reality.

"The Cambridge Foundation really stepped up," she said. "They helped us over a three-year period and believed in us when it looked like just a fantasy to some folks, and we weren't sure ourselves how long it was going to take."
